



On March 11, 2011, an earthquake struck off the coast of Japan, causing a devastating tsunami that swept over cities and farmland in the northern part of the country. Recorded as 9.0 on the Richter scale, it was the most powerful quake ever to hit the country. As the nation struggled with a rescue effort, it also faced the worst nuclear emergency since Chernobyl.

The New York Times reported as of April 7, the official death toll had been raised to 12,600, and more than 14,700 people were listed as missing, although there may be some overlap between the two groups. The final toll is expected to reach nearly 20,000. More than 160,000 people remained housed in temporary shelters; tens of thousands of others evacuated their homes due to the nuclear crisis.

DPNY has chosen to donate the money raised from this concert to Japan Society. On March 12, 2011, Japan Society, a prominent nonprofit organization representing the Japanese community in New York City, created the Japan Earthquake Relief Fund. With the funds that have been generously donated so far, they have committed \$1,000,000 to four nonprofit organizations in Japan—the Tokyo Volunteer Network for Disaster Relief, JEN, Entrepreneurial Training for Innovative Communities (ETIC), and the Japan NPO Center—all on the front lines of relief and recovery in the affected area.
